Women in the Bible

What does the Bible have to say about women to women? Feminist interpretation of the Bible has broadened over the years to include Latin American, African, and Asian women, who have brought the distinctive insight of their post-colonial cultures to biblical interpretation. This series includes three classes:

February 5: "It's All Interpretation." Where we have come from in the interpretation of the Bible and why it matters that we are here now.

February 12: "Why Do the Women of the Bible Always Get Blamed?" A look at the history of the treatment of women in the interpretation of the Bible

February 19: "It's All about Liberation." The voices of Third World women in interpreting the Bible.

Do Low-Income Students Have Equal Access to Effective Teachers?

A recent federal study surprisingly shows that, despite a large student achievement gap, low-income students have teachers who are as effective as those of high-income students. This talk is given by the study's principal investigator (and Grace member) on the economic issues in American public education and what can be done to address them.

Jesus and the Renewal of Community Life**February 26, March 12***Ray Pickett, Professor, Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago*

This two-part series focuses on Jesus' Galilean ministry in its turbulent political context. The Gospels describe Jesus leading a prophetic renewal movement responding to adverse social and economic effects of Herod Antipas' project of urbanization. In contrast to individualistic interpretations of Jesus' ministry, we will explore how Jesus is restoring community life from the margins.

What do Christian worship and ecology have in common? Literally *everything*. Both worship and ecology extend our vision in wonder to see how the entire cosmos — everything — is interconnected and works together for good, even “very good.” This two-week series explores the ways in which Christian worship links the songs of earth and heaven

The Complexities of Addressing God as Father in the Epistle to the Hebrews**April 23***Amy Peeler, Professor, New Testament, Wheaton College*

The Epistle to the Hebrews stands as one of the great theological documents of the New Testament. This powerful sermon-letter provides pithy phrases and deep theological principles that have shaped the thought and life of the church. This first session introduces the epistle, including its possible historical setting (“Who wrote Hebrews?” is an age-old question) and outlines its logic and major themes.

The Complexities of Addressing God as Father in the Epistle to the Hebrews**April 30***Amy Peeler, Professor, New Testament, Wheaton College*

Part two of the series focuses on the often ignored, but vital theme in Hebrews of the Fatherhood of God. Because the author introduces God as the Father of Jesus Christ and the Father of the Epistle's readers, Hebrews provides insight into the paternal character of God. This second class addresses the challenges and blessings for contemporary believers in addressing God as our Father, with Hebrews as our guide.

This talk discusses the history and unique features of Grace's beautiful Memorial Garden, with a focus on remembrance for Mother's Day.
