Description of ministry: The mission of Concordia Place is to create involved communities where all our neighbors can gather, learn, and grow. Concordia Lutheran Church, a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), created Concordia Place over thirty years ago. Rooted in the Gospel's message of God's grace for all people, we provide proactive solutions to key social needs. We serve 750 people annually through economically inclusive early childhood, teen leadership, and senior wellness programs. In *Early Learning and Preschool*, we support approximately 350 children (6 weeks to 5 years) in preparing not just for kindergarten, but for a life of learning. In our *School Age* programming, just over 120 children (6 – 12 years) are in a safe, learning environment with professional teaching staff during critical out-of-school hours. In the year-round Emerging Leaders program, 125 teens are engaged in service-learning activities that build a wide-range of ecological, nutritional, and entrepreneurial skills. Finally, in *Adult and Senior* programming, 150 community members are active in English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, health and wellness programs, and transportation and companionship services for the homebound elderly.

Areas served: North Chicago: North Center, Avondale, Logan Square, Albany Park, and Belmont-Craigin communities.

Donation Needs: Monetary gifts or gifts-in-kind, such as auction items for our annual benefit.

Volunteer Needs: Senior Lift provides transportation to seniors and Special Event Committee participants. Corporate Involvement and Leadership Opportunities are also available.

Description of ministry: Kidz Express is a 501(3)c nonprofit that serves the most at-risk and hardest to reach children, along with their families, in one of the nation's most underserved urban environments. 100% of the participants in our program are African American youth who live at or below poverty level. The poverty and associated problems of poor academics, unemployment, teen pregnancy, gang problems and violence are well documented in police reports and the daily news. Kidz Express provides holistic solutions to the urban challenges of South Austin by building a continuum of community support to strengthen family economic security and foster positive youth development. The centerpiece of the programming is our out of school time programs including our after school program, which operates from September to June during the Chicago Public School academic year, and our summer program. One of the primary objectives of the comprehensive strategy is to increase the academic performance of children participating in the Kidz Express programs. Every day during the after school program the first hour is devoted to academics, including homework and tutoring.

Description of Ministry: The Navajo Lutheran Mission is a 60 year old ministry among the Navajo people living on the remote high-desert region of northeastern Arizona. The daily operation of the Mission includes the Navajo Christian Preparatory Academy (currently 53 students), House of Prayer Lutheran Church (ELCA), Hozho Café (meals for the hungry), a Cultural Center teaching Navajo tradition, a Wellness Center open to the community, and guest accommodations for volunteers. The Mission's purpose is to connect diverse faith communities to the needs of the Navajo people, seeking to build bridges of understanding and shared values. Through cultural sharing, the Mission provides a safe environment for respectful listening, healing and reconciliation, and where integrity and truth guide and empower the Navajo people to lead a socially and economically sustainable community. Visitors and volunteers are welcome at the Mission to experience the tradition and spirituality of the Native American people.

Area served: Located on the Navajo Nation, the 5-acre Mission serves the small town of Rock Point, Arizona. The community encompasses a 10 mile radius with a population of 2500 people living on the land in family clans. Many residents live without running water, heat or electricity. Forty miles from Four Corners, 50 miles from the nearest hospital or grocery store, and 115 miles from general shopping in New Mexico, the small town of Rock Point consists of a gas station/convenience store, laundromat, a post office, a Bureau of Indian Education School, a Chapter House and Senior Center.

Donation needs: Student and Classroom Sponsorships (see brochure); quilts, clothing for all ages, dollar donations for community assistance programs (firewood/propane, meals, medical needs); funding/grants related to education, healthcare, nutrition, or skill building for all ages; transportation/vehicle operating and maintenance cost; Foundation and bequest/legacy gifts that support designated as well as capital expenditures.

Volunteer needs: Networking support to create awareness, visitors and volunteers who wish to engage in learning Navajo culture and spirituality, Board of Director leadership (application process), prayer for the Navajo people and Mission leadership, quilt-making, teacher assistance in the classroom. Description of ministry: A mixed Christian day school operating on student-paid fees in an overpopulated, poor and remote area of Kenya, East Africa. Grace provides scholarship aid to two students in each class (a total of eight) who participate in a work-study program. In addition, Grace provides merit and needs-based scholarships to other students.

Area served: Rural Africa; densely populated subsistence farm area

Donation needs: Books & scholarship money. Grace is the backbone of the scholarship program. Lab supplies, stationery, science and agricultural equipment, dictionaries, bibles. There is a continuing need to construct new housing for teachers and to secure better water resources and to raise \$10,000 for new textbooks.

Volunteer needs: Teachers, perhaps people in the year or two after college. Possibilities for a mission team visit combined with travel.

Description of ministry: Walther Christian Academy ministers to God's young people by nurturing and educating the total student. Walther assists families by promoting spiritual, academic, social and physical development in a Christ-centered environment. Providing high quality academics, engaging extra-curricular activities and athletics, Walther serves families with students in preschool through 12th grade at their dual campus in Melrose Park. Annually, 100% of Walther seniors apply to and are accepted into college with members of the 2015 class earning an average of \$120,000 in college scholarships and financial aid. Grace is a member of the Walther Lutheran High School Association and one of Walther High Schools' founding congregations. Grace members and grade school graduates represent approximately 10% of Walther's current high school enrollment. The Bronco Resale Shop (5517 St. Charles Road in Berkeley) provides gently used clothing and household items to individuals and families in the community. Proceeds from sales support academic programs at Walther Christian Academy.

Area served: The majority of students reside in the near-west suburbs with some travelling from as far as Chicago's Pilsen neighborhood, LaGrange, and Lombard to attend the high school.

Donation needs: Financial contributions to fund student scholarships and financial aid are the primary need. Three out of four high school students qualify for either a discount on tuition or a financial aid grant with collected tuition covering only 80% of the general operating budget. Support from association churches and individual contributions helps to meet this budget shortfall and ensures the continued success of the school.

Volunteer Needs: A variety of volunteer opportunities exist from working at the Bronco Resale Shop and helping out in the school office to organizing special events and helping with maintenance and facility upgrades. Description of ministry: The Center for Christian Education provides educational programs serving children and adults in post-communist Slovakia. Founded in 1998 with the opening of the Bible School, the Center has continued to expand its outreach to include programs for other age groups. A Lutheran-based ministry, it serves both the Lutheran Church in Slovakia and beyond as well as other Christian confessions.

Today, its ministries include the following:

- **The Lutheran Academy:** Currently offering Pre-school through bilingual high school, it serves nearly 600 pupils.
- **The Bible School:** Offering lay leadership training, BeFriender ministry training program and university-level education: undergraduate program in youth and children ministry and a master's-level program in Christian education via the **Department of Religious Studies** of a nearby University of Žilina.
- **Vacation Bible School and Summer Youth Camps:** Summer programs for children and teenagers delivered with the help of volunteers from U.S. partner churches. The Center sends a mission team to lead junior high camp in Serbia.
- **English as a Second Language (ESL) classes:** Summer program staffed by volunteers from U.S. partner churches. Separate two-week sessions are offered for children and adults and are held on the Martin campus.
- Grace's former teacher **Benjamin Chandler** currently serves as ESL teacher for the Lutheran Academy in Martin. Other American teachers are **Blythe** and **Anthony Barreto**; Blythe serves as the International communications director.

Area served: Slovakia and Central Europe

Donations needed: Grace Church's directed benevolence contribution underwrites the salary of Tomáš Gulán, a high school teacher, school band director and missions coordinator at the Center for Christian

Description of ministry: CGLA supports people working to stabilize their lives by removing or preventing obstacles to economic opportunity, strengthening families and preventing homelessness. Founded in 1973 to support Cabrini Green - a public housing project located on Chicago's Near North Side - CGLA has strengthened the lives, families and communities of more than 50,000 individuals. In FY14 CGLA served 6,500 people including 450 referrals from 24 strategic partners throughout Chicago. CGLA's programs focus on people who have had previous arrests or convictions and emphasize three important factors to individual and family stabilization - improved legal standing, social and emotional support and connection to community services. CGLA's model is based on an interdisciplinary approach, where attorneys work directly with clients to resolve the legal issue while our social workers help them develop realistic goals and service plans to support their desired legal outcomes. We work collaboratively with strategic partners to provide employment, housing and supportive services, empowering clients to achieve their goals and invest in their futures.

Description of ministry: Chicago Uptown Ministry (a program of Lutheran Child and Family Services of Illinois) is a faith-based safe haven in a community well-known for its large homeless population, facilitating and supporting the passage of individuals from the fringes of society into the mainstream. Chicago Uptown Ministry serves the homeless, immigrants and low-income families in Chicago's Uptown neighborhood. It builds community between people from all walks of life in order to bring about self-sufficiency, hope and justice. The food pantry serves as a bridge to a number of other services including: ESL

classes, after-school programming, AA meetings, support groups for the mentally ill, seniors, parish nursing, substance-abuse treatment referral services and social-justice advocacy. Doors are open daily to provide a safe and friendly environment for community members.

Description of ministry: Hope for Grieving Children Africa (HGCA) trains pastors, community leaders and orphan caregivers with the knowledge, skills, and support needed to address the grief and suffering of children traumatized by parental loss. Work has focused on Zambia (12 million population), where there are more than 1.2 million orphans, and in neighboring Mozambique. Since its beginning, HGCA) has trained over 1,500 individuals, including pastors, children's home workers, caregivers of orphans and community workers caring for street children. HGCA has also reached teachers in multiple school system and has directly impacted more than 21,000 orphan children Those trained in our curriculum have gone on to start more than 2,500 grass roots orphan support projects. Trainees learn about the symptoms of grief and strategies for alleviating grief at different stages of childhood development. The training is called “How to Love a Grieving Child” and was originally developed by Dr. Richard Matteson in order to address the needs of AIDS orphans in Africa. HGCA has also begun a new project this year providing a discipleship and vocational training school for orphaned youth in their late teens to early 20's, which provides individualized

vocational training and life skills that equip these older orphans to gain employment and contribute to their communities.

SOCIAL MINISTRY OF GRACE CHURCH

The Social Ministry Committee

The Social Ministry Committee is one of the standing committees of Grace. Its mandate is to help Grace members become aware of and supportive of people in need in our communities, and to facilitate hands-on service projects for this purpose. Some of these projects or ministries are also supported financially through the Grace Benevolence Committee. You'll note this below when you are directed to the Agency Description within the Benevolence Committee listings. During the course of a typical year, the committee assists the following groups. We are always on the lookout for additional deserving non-profits that might benefit from Grace involvement.

Bethel New Life - (see page 11)

Bethel New Life operates as a community investment organization on Chicago's West Side, including Chicago's Austin, West and East Garfield Park, Humboldt Park and North Lawndale communities. Bethel provides affordable housing for families and seniors, helps people returning from prison to find legal employment, and provides programs for neighborhood youth. Grace members contribute gifts for youth and seniors during the annual Christmas gift drive.

Bread for the World

Annually, Grace members are provided an opportunity to send letters to members of Congress in support of important legislation identified by Bread for the World. This is often called a "Harvest of Letters" and occurs on two different Sundays during the year.

Chicago Uptown Ministry / Lutheran Child and Family Services - (see page 12)

Grace members regularly contribute non-perishable food in bins in the atrium or coatroom, which is donated to the Uptown food pantry. In addition, during hunger month, members are given large paper bags to fill with food and return to church. Uptown Ministry is one of four pantries receiving the donations that are then delivered by Grace members. Uptown Ministry also receives gift cards purchased by Grace members during the annual Christmas gift drive.

Description of ministry: Founded in 1977 as the result of the appearance of the Virgin Mary in France, a group of nuns from France came to the United States (and other countries) to serve the destitute, and chose Chicago's west side. They purchased a church building at 502 N. Central Avenue as a mother-house and site of their social services. Fraternite sponsors a soup kitchen, as well as the bag lunches for the homeless. It

also operates a full-service bakery. Once a month, volunteers from Grace make 300 sandwiches and fill 150 brown bag lunches with the sandwiches plus commodities donated by groceries and other food service sectors. The Fraternalite nuns then deliver these lunches in their vehicles to the homeless on the streets in Chicago. In addition, Fraternalite sponsors one of four local food pantries receiving non-perishable food donated by Grace members. Every Thanksgiving, Grace members donate more than 50 turkeys and pumpkin pies toward Fraternalite's Thanksgiving Day Dinner for the homeless.

Donation needs: Books, games, toys, arts & crafts, musical instruments, children's clothing, food.

Thanksgiving needs: Turkeys and pumpkin pies. Christmas needs: New unwrapped toys for their Christmas party (700 children).

Volunteer Needs: Volunteers are needed to help in the soup kitchen and the after-school program (e.g. making arts & crafts, playing games, going on field trips).

Members help to pack lunches throughout the year and collect food for Thanksgiving meals.

Grace Lutheran School - Karlov Street

Grace school is located in Chicago at 28th and Karlov Streets. Originally settled by families of recent European origin, the Little Village neighborhood and the school are now almost exclusively Spanish-speaking. The K-8 school has four classrooms, each accommodating two grade levels. Every August, our members are asked to donate school supplies for the benefit of three Lutheran parochial schools, including Grace-Karlov. As a result of your generosity, prior to the opening of the school year, bags full of a wide range of supplies are delivered by the Social Ministry Committee to these schools.

Its commodities are donated or purchased. The professional staff depends on volunteers for much of the work. Once a year, volunteers from Grace spend a Saturday in the warehouse, unpacking, re-packing, and storing whatever food products are scheduled for distribution.

Hephzibah is a multi-program child welfare agency located in Oak Park. It offers after-school day care

services for 450 children in eight elementary schools and its home base, plus summer day care for 245 children. It also provides assessment, support and other social services for families, plus foster care placement and adoption. Throughout the year, Grace members drop off children's clothing that is donated to Hephzibah.

Holy Family Ministries

Founded originally in the Cabrini-Green public housing area, Holy Family Lutheran School moved to the Lawndale neighborhood in 2008. It is a faith-based, secure parochial school, offering pre-school plus K-8 education to area children. Tuition constitutes one-fourth of the annual budget, the balance coming from donations and fund-raisers. Every August, Grace members contribute school supplies for the benefit of three Chicago Lutheran schools. Holy Family is one of them. Prior to the beginning of each school year, bags of a wide variety of school supplies contributed by members are carried to the schools by members of the Social Ministry Committee.

Housing Forward (Formerly PADS) (see page 14)

Housing Forward is the only social service agency in west Cook County with a comprehensive "housing + services" solution for transitioning individuals and families out of homelessness. Grace members make more than 100 lunches one time each month for the guests at two overnight emergency shelters.

Lutheran Child and Family Services - (see page 14)

Founded in 1873, LCFS is a state-wide human care agency, providing a broad range of social services. It offers foster care and adoption services as well as a residential facility for children at Lutherbrook. It also offers an array of services to help strengthen families, individuals and communities, including the provision of food and clothing. Grace members regularly contribute non-perishable food in bins located in the coatroom or Atrium. Annually in the spring, in a hunger month food drive, members are offered a large paper shopping bag to fill with foodstuffs and to return to church. Food collected is delivered to four local pantries, including one that is sponsored by Lutheran Child and Family Services. LCFS also receives children's gifts during the annual Christmas gift drive.

Lutheran Unity East School

Grace members provide school supplies to this school in Chicago's Logan Square neighborhood. Lutheran Unity has a rich history of educating students with a tradition that spans more than 100 years.

New Moms - (see page 16)

New Moms was founded in 1983 to serve teen-age mothers and their children. Through a wide variety of supportive programs, it strives to "enable, empower, and equip" these families. Headquartered in the Logan Square/Humboldt park area it has served 1,000 persons in its history. Health, counseling, childcare, employment counseling and supportive housing are among its award-winning programs. During the Christmas season, Grace members take a "tag" off the Christmas tree which gives the age and gender of a gift-recipient for a person served by New Moms. The gifts are taken to New Moms by a member of the church's Social Ministry Committee.

The Night Ministry - (see page 16)

Members cook a meal for the Crib, a homeless shelter, run by the Night Ministry, for teens and young adults up to 21 years old in Chicago's Lakeview community. Grace members donate toiletries and other sundries that are stuffed into stockings made by Grace members for the annual Christmas drive. The stockings are distributed by the Night Ministry to homeless teens and young adults. Grace School children help stuff the stockings and raise money for toiletries through a bake sale.

North Austin Head Start

This is one of five Head Start programs sponsored by the Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) in the Chicago area. Located near North and Central Streets, it welcomes three- to five year olds, providing educational, nutritional, and health services. It offers half day and full day programs. Each year at Christmastime, Grace members bring mittens and other articles of small clothing to the tree in the Atrium. These are then picked up by the staff of the Head Start Program for distribution to needy pre-school children.

Oak-Leyden Developmental Services

In Oak-Leyden's Developmental Therapy Program, adults with developmental disabilities receive training in skills of daily living, social and leisure skills, communication, and vocational skills. The skills help individuals with developmental disabilities become as independent as possible in their everyday lives. Grace members provide Christmas gifts for adults in Oak-Leyden's group homes.

OPRF Food Pantry - (see page 10)

Members cook a meal for the Crib, a homeless shelter, run by the Night Ministry, for teens and young adults up to 21 years old in Chicago's Lakeview community. Grace members donate toiletries and other sundries that are stuffed into stockings made by Grace members for the annual Christmas drive. The stockings are distributed by the Night Ministry to homeless teens and young adults. Grace School children help stuff the stockings and raise money for toiletries through a bake sale.

Grace members regularly contribute non-perishable food in bins located in the coatroom or atrium. Also, in "hunger month", members are given a large brown shopping bag to fill with food and return. The OPRF food pantry is one of the four agencies receiving these donations, which are delivered by church members.
