"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Luke 19:38

These words were shouted on Palm Sunday as Jesus triumphantly entered Jerusalem. Who shouted them? Luke tells us that it was a "whole multitude" of those following Jesus. As we near Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter, I find myself thinking about this "whole multitude." What if we had a whole multitude of God's people, a large crowd of Jesus' disciples, gathered together again at Grace? What if more and more of our Palm Sunday "Hosannas!" and our Easter "Alleluias!" were acclaimed in person, together at Grace?

As we draw near once more to the cross of Calvary and Easter's empty tomb, perhaps it is time for more of us to consider returning to in-person worship at Grace. Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection stand at the heart of our faith. How good to be together to

celebrate these divine mysteries! I am also thinking beyond Easter Sunday, however, to the weekly patterns of coming together as the Body of Christ to receive the Body of Christ.

We will continue to livestream our worship services. This

technology has enabled us to remain connected to one another throughout a multi-year pandemic. It will continue to provide meaningful connections for members who are sick or homebound. It enables members to remain connected while out of town. It even enables my mother to worship with Grace from her home in Minnesota! The technology is a gift we will continue to utilize, with many thanks to those who volunteer to make the livestream happen each week.

Online worship is not the same as being together

Nevertheless, it is simply not the same as being together in person.

Worshipping online provides only some of the experience. When we worship from home, we miss out on connecting with others; we lose the chance to share our joys and sorrows in spontaneous, Spirit-filled conversations before or after worship. We deprive one another of the gift that is our presence, our voice added

to the songs and prayers of the people. And while the Word comes through loud and clear online, we miss out on the sacramental moment when God is placed in our hands in the bread and wine of Holy Communion. This is something that

When we worship from home ... we lose the chance to share our joys and sorrows in spontaneous, Spirit-filled conversations before or after worship. only happens when we are gathered together, flesh-and-blood people receiving the flesh and blood of Jesus Christ.

It is, of course, up to each of you to decide when the time is right to return. Many already have. For some, due to increased risk of serious illness, connecting online is still the right choice.

It is a choice I respect. But I also want you to know you are missed. Jesus Christ is God incarnate; Jesus is an in-person God. As we celebrate his resurrection from the dead, we invite you to return to Grace. I look forward to seeing you in the multitude of those shouting "Hosanna, Alleluia!"

Returning to the common cup at Holy Communion

We will return to offering the common cup during Holy Communion at Grace beginning at the Easter Vigil.

In our Christian liturgical tradition the common cup is a powerful symbol of our life together in Christ. Taking the body of Christ into our bodies in the sacrament, we become the body of Christ, and having been given the blood of Christ as a gift, his risen life now flows through our veins and we are poured out for the sake of the world. This never happens to us simply as individuals. We are always the body of Christ together. This powerful truth is symbolized by the sharing of the common cup.

However, it is understandable to be concerned about germs being being transmitted from one person to another via the common cup. Some experts have studied this question (though not directly in relation to the covid virus) and have stated that the risk of transmission is very small, and probably much smaller than that of contracting an infection by other methods in any gathering of people. And using a cloth to wipe the rim of the cup after each person drinks, as we do at Grace, has been shown to greatly reduce bacteria on the rim of the cup.

As has been our long-standing practice, we will continue to offer the wine in individual cups. With the return of the common cup, you are also welcome to dip the wafer into the wine (intinction) if you prefer.

Whether you choose to receive the wine from the common cup, an individual cup, or by intinction, know that God promises to always meet you in this meal, no matter what. In the bread and wine we are given the fulness of Jesus Christ, his life, forgiveness, and salvation. So come and receive Christ's body and blood given and shed for you.

Josef Haydn's "Seven Last Words of Our Savior on the Cross"

Monday, April 11, 7 p.m. Kontras Quartet and Gracia Grindal

The Kontras Quartet will again play Joseph Haydn's "The Seven Last Words of Our Savior on the Cross" at Grace on Monday evening of Holy Week, April 11, beginning at 7 p.m. The musicians will be joined by poet and theologian Gracia M. Grindal. She will read selections from her book, "Jesus, a Harmony," in which she wrote 366 poems on the life of Jesus.

Haydn's music provides an opportunity to meditate on Christ's passion, as anguish and lament combine with a sense of serene majesty and transcendence. Grindal's poety adds another level of reflection on the meaning of the salvation story for our lives.

Gracia Grindal is a retired professor of rhetoric and pastoral theology at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. Her hymns and hymn translations are published in many hymnals including *Lutheran Book of Worship*. Her most recent book of poetry is titled *The Sword of Eden: Eve and Mary Speak*. It connects the two women within the biblical story of salvation, using poems written in sonnet form. Saturday, April 16, 7 p.m.

Easter picture books are for everyone!

The books in the church library along the north wall under the windows are identified as "children's books." But they really should be called FAMILY books. Wonderful, read-aloud stories enjoyed by everyone!

Here are some suggestions for the Easter season:



Peter's First Easter by Walter Wangerin. Follow in the imagined footsteps of the disciple Peter from the Lord's Supper through the crucifixion to Easter morning – and all the way to Jesus' command, "Feed my sheep."

The First Easter by Nancy Skarmeas. Written almost like a chapter book, each page shares a traditional painted

illustration along with stories about Jesus's life from the calling of the disciples to his ascension.

The Time of Easter by Suzanne Richterkessing. One of the "Mouse Prints" series explaining the seasons of the church year for children, this book shares many of our Lutheran Lent and Easter traditions.

The Legend of the Easter Robin by Dandi Daley Mackall. This beautifully illustrated book shares the Pennsylvania Dutch legend of the compassion of the robin and the sacrifice of Christ.

The Easter Story by Brian Wildsmith. The small donkey who carried Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday becomes a witness to the passion of the Savior, his resurrection and eventual ascension. The detailed, gold-tone illustrations will hold your attention long after the words are read.

Our Rohingya family is adapting well to living in America. The husband has a job working as a cleaner at Midway. This is not the job he was hoping for, but it supports his family for the short term, and he is always looking for a better opportunity. He cooks us wonderful ethnic dishes when we visit. The mother is picking up English so quickly! She has already mastered all the lessons offered by RefugeeOne and will be joining another virtual class soon.

The two boys are in Chicago public schools and doing well. The youngest is a rambunctious little girl who is eager to get outside now that the weather is getting warmer.

We have officially passed the six-month co-sponsor requirement with this family – but clearly have fallen in love with them and will remain available to assist them with new issues as they come up.

Our Afghan family is also finding their way in American culture. As you may remember, the father of this family died shortly before their evacuation. So, although he wants to attend school full time, the oldest son has taken a job to help his family cover their expenses. He will attend college part time for now.

The next two boys are doing well in school. Their English is improving quickly, and they look forward to summer adventures in Chicago. The three youngest girls are home with their mother. Recently a family at Grace donated a bike for one of the girls, and the fourth-grade class at Grace School collected funds to purchase a new futon for them.

Grace Vocations Scholarships: Raising up a new generation of leaders for God's work in the world

Applications for Grace Vocations Scholarships are being accepted through June 15, 2022. If you've heard of these scholarships before, perhaps you thought they are for students going to seminary to become a pastor. While that is certainly true, the mission and purpose is far broader as the first paragraph on the application clearly states:

Recognizing the blessings of strong leadership, Grace Lutheran Church is committed to an intentional focus of raising up a new generation of leaders for the mission and ministry of the church. Through the Church Vocations Initiative, Grace will provide support, encouragement, and financial assistance to members who wish to pursue a vocational ministry, either within the church or in the secular world.

In a world changed by Covid-19, itself a corona or crown of thorns, questions about what truly matters have come to more prominence. There are entire fields of study on the impact of spirituality on physical and mental health. Others study ecospirituality as a means for supporting environmental sustainability – literally the work of protecting Creation given to us by God in the first chapter of Genesis. Careers in equity, fairness, and building a values-based economy can also be a route for pursuing God's work in the secular world.

All these fields of study and career goals qualify as pursuit of a vocational ministry that can be supported by a Grace Vocations Scholarship. Recent recipients have used it to pursue medical and social work degrees as well as seminary study.

It helped me knowing that the people of Grace saw something in me, that they were willing to take a chance on a college kid who didn't know exactly what path she would take. At that point, it wasn't clear that I'd have a church vocation, but I always felt that support and encouragement!

Vocation Scholarships are Grace's way of strengthening the signal so that the word of Christ can be heard.
