They are waiting. Leaving the house this morning, our kids happily reported, "Only seven and a half days left!" Left of what? School, of course. My kids like school; after all, they attend Grace! Still, the allure of summer is too strong for even the most studious children to resist. And so they wait, yearning for the warm breath of summer breezes.


As a parent, I not only look forward to summer; I look back upon a year of growth. My kids are another year closer to discovering who they will be when they grow up. Much more importantly,

they have learned more about who they are: children of God, beloved and redeemed by Jesus Christ, alive with the breath of the

Holy Spirit. They may be waiting for summer vacation (which is closer now as you read this than when I wrote it), and they may be waiting for what the future brings, but they don't need to wait to know who they are. They are children of God, named and claimed in the waters of baptism.

On Pentecost, the disciples are waiting. They have been waiting fifty days since the surprising dawn of Easter. For the last ten days, they've been waiting without the presence of Jesus. He has ascended to his Father. They have been left to wait. Not idly, however. They devote themselves to prayer. They discern and call Matthias to replace Judas Iscariot as one of the Twelve. But they wait, unsure of what God will do next; uncertain as to what they will be when they grow up, you might say.



Then, on the day of Pentecost, their waiting comes to an end: "Suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a

tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2:2-4).

Suddenly, the future was wide open. It was also grounded firmly in the past. They speak to the crowds of God's deeds of power, specifically of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, of how their future and everything they will become has already been promised and guaranteed by God for the sake of Jesus Christ. Whatever the disciples become, they are already who they are: children of God, beloved and redeemed by Jesus Christ, alive with the breath of the Holy Spirit.

The work of the Holy Spirit is not to make us more "spiritual," whatever that might mean. The Holy Spirit is poured out upon us to connect us in faith to the risen Christ. St. Paul writes,


"When we cry, 'Abba! Father!' it is that very Spirit bearing witness

with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ" (Romans 8:15b-17a). The Spirit comes to remind us of who we already are, and then calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies us to help bring God's future to pass.

We have seen the Holy Spirit in action recently, poured out in Holy Baptism upon the Galeener siblings and the Starrick siblings. It is a marvelous thing to see the Spirit so clearly at work. As we enter summer and a new season in the church year, we are called to open ourselves to the Spirit's work, even when the Spirit's actions are not as clear. To what ministry, at Grace and beyond, are we being called? Where do

we need enlightenment? For what purposes has God made us holy? Answering the Spirit's invitation to gather with other Christians in worship can make the answers to these questions clearer. I hope to see you at Grace throughout the summer, listening for the Spirit's voice on Sunday mornings and at GLOW.

Whatever the future holds, this summer and beyond; whatever you become (if ever you grow up); no matter what unfolds in this world's uncertain future, know this: You are already who you need to be. You are a child of God, forgiven and freed by the work of Christ. Upon you has the Holy Spirit been poured out. In you, by the Spirit, God has taken up residence. Whatever you've been waiting for, you don't have to wait for God's promise. Sent by the Father and the Son, the Spirit is with you, and you are alive in Christ.

Sabbatical for Pastor Costello

Church budgeted contributions

July 1, 2021 – April 26, 2022 \$ 1,772,000 (47 Sundays, \$37,700 per week)

Church actual contributions

July 1, 2021 – April 26, 2022 \$ 1,498,000 (Last year at this time: \$1,403,000)

Church giving is \$274,000 (15%) below budget and \$95,000 (7%) ahead of last year.

The General Fund deficit is estimated to be approximately \$140,000 as of Tuesday, May 31. This compares to a \$231,000 deficit through May 31 in 2021. We are in better shape than we were a year ago, but still need increased giving during the month of June to erase the deficit.

Representatives of the Center for Christian Education (CCE) in Martin, Slovakia, visited Grace on the weekend of May 20-22. Pastor Natalia Kacianova was our guest preacher in Sunday morning worship. She and Magdalena Valco also visited the 8th grade class at Grace School and told students about Slovakia and about the work being done in Martin to assist people crossing the border from Ukraine seeking safety. Eighth grade classes at Grace traditionally collect money for a class gift to a charitable organization chosen by the students. This year's class is directing their gift to the CCE, for ministry to Ukrainian refugees.

Approximately 80 people attended the Slovak Benefit Dinner on Friday evening, May 20, and enjoyed traditional Slovak goulash prepared by Bohdan Hrobon and Adrian Kacian. Money raised at the dinner supports programs at the CCE that spread the gospel in this post-communist part of the world and reintroduce a church which is faithful to its calling and relevant in today's society.

From the archives

Remembering Albert Enno Kaeppel and the Illuminations

The curious documents pictured at right can be seen in the Grace Church archives. The artist who created them, Albert Enno Kaeppel, wrote about them in a 2005 letter to Grace member John Stanger who had inquired about them.

Rev. Otto Geiseman [pastor of Grace 1922-63] was a friend of mine as well as my minister and handball opponent. ... He asked me to produce some different type of remembrance for valued gifts by members of the congregation. ... I was 18 years old and an art student at the Art Institute on Michigan Avenue.

What Kaeppel came up with were parchment memorials, illuminated in the style of medieval manuscripts such as the Book of Kells. The plan was to bind the individual pages together in a book that would be kept in the narthex of the church. That never happened, but the 12 illuminations and the book title page (top right) are still in the archives, along with a clipping from the Oak Leaves, the local paper, explaining the project.

Kaeppel died in 2010 at the age of 102. He told Stanger:

I have spent a great part of my life as an artist and my oil painting were my livelihood. I have visited and painted in more than 20 countries over the years.

He was still producing art in his 97th year.

A few parting words from the editor of Grace Notes

On June 30, my last day as a Grace Staff member, I will be cleaning out my office, which lies in a far corner of the building, two flights of stairs above the church library. I'll be sorting out books and music, cleaning out files both physical and digital, deciding which personal items to take home and which ones to take to the dumpster.

I will also take down the ephemera from my bulletin board. Ephemera may not be the right word for the postcards, newspaper clippings and odd bits of this and that on my bulletin board; ephemera means "transitory creations not meant to be retained or preserved." The things on my bulletin board are there to help me remember things. Some are there for obvious reasons. Others — I am still puzzling about some of them.

There are postcards from places I've visited — places that have fueled both curiosity and contentment. There's a photo I took of the four young women who sang in my Joyful Voices choir: they're standing up tall, hands clasped in "Sound of Music" singing position and peering into the camera over their glasses, as I so often peered at them from the piano. There's a comical drawing of J. S. Bach on a postcard from the Bach House in Eisenach, Germany. The scowl on the great man's face is frightfully serious yet somehow reminds me of all the delight to be found in the great man's music. There's a page from a daily calendar with a quote from Ella Fitzgerald: "The only thing better than singing is more singing." There's a notecard with Romans 8:38 in calligraphy ("I am persuaded that neither life nor death...") There are mementos of my children and of shows I've directed and a bracelet that came to me from a former colleague who passed away in 2014. She still reminds me to take the time to do it right.

There's also a column of quotes typed out on plain white paper in my choice of fonts. Not surprisingly, one is about misogyny. Many are about writing:

"The most valuable of all talents is that of never using two words when one will do." *Thomas Jefferson*

"Words ought to be a little wild, for they are the assault of thoughts on the unthinking." John Maynard Keynes as quoted by Paul Krugman

"Keep typing until it turns into writing." David Carr

More pretentiously:

"Tell the truth. Don't decorate. Remember death."

I don't know where this one came from some dozen or more years ago. It seemed like something to try to live into, if only in a modest way as a church communicator.

Several years later I posted another darkish quote, this one a bit of a puzzle:

"I love the thing that I most wish had not happened." Stephen Colbert


It's from an interview published in GQ, August 15, 2015. Colbert, host of "The Late Show" on CBS, is the youngest of 11 children. His father and the two brothers closest to him in age were killed in a plane crash when he was 10. The statement comes from his attempts to explain how his mother, a devout Catholic, and he himself managed to survive this tragedy.

It is a paradoxical statement and it was stapled to my bulletin board because I wondered how it could possibly be true. It was something I tested in my own life as I watched my son Kris fight the good fight of dying from ALS. Before and after his death in July of 2017, I would stare at this statement and say, no, I'm not there, not there yet.

But maybe I am there now. This is hard to explain. It's something about the largeness of love, and how that love originates in God and grows as we love others through good times and bad. Something about love living larger and longer than anger. Something centered in a cross.

From my office I can hear the organ played in church — musicians practicing, tuners tuning, organists playing hymns as the congregation sings. From the computer on my desk I've sent both death notices and festive Easter and Christmas worship schedules to the people of Grace. I've churned out 80 or 90 issues of Grace Notes and many more email newsletters, each one full of details about lives shared, life treasured, as we live and love one another, together in Christ.

I was a member of Grace and of the choir before I had this job and I will continue as a Grace member and a soprano in the choir after I retire on June 30. I plan to do more writing in retirement.
