WELCOME TO GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH

We welcome you in the name of Jesus Christ as we gather to hear God's holy Word and celebrate the meal of Holy Communion. We are blessed by your presence, just as you are. As God welcomes all people through the saving grace of Jesus, so do we seek to welcome God's people of all races, social statuses, physical and mental abilities, sexual orientations, and gender identities to be together in Christ – to love, to grow, and to serve. Should you have no church home, you are invited to consider Grace. We encourage you to fill out the perforated page on the back of the bulletin and place it in the offering plate. Welcome!

Children's resources, including activity bags, worship bulletins and booster seats, are available in the narthex and from the ushers.

Nursery care is provided at most worship services for children ages 4 and under. The nursery is located across from Fellowship Hall. From the atrium, go through the Lamb Door by the elevator, up half a flight of stairs and turn right. From the sanctuary, go through the door by the stone baptismal font, up the stairs and turn left. A silent paging system allows the nursery staff to contact parents when needed. (There is no nursery provided Sunday, July 3rd.)

Assistance in Worship: For those who find it difficult to stand during any part of the service, please remain seated and contact an usher if you would like Holy Communion to be brought to you. Sound enhancement units are available in the back of the church. Large print bulletins are available from the ushers in the back of the church and at the Division Street door.

Altar Flowers can be sponsored by members to celebrate a special occasion or to honor the memory of a loved one. Donations are forty dollars per arrangement. Stop by the front desk to sign up.

Please silence all cell phones and other electronic devices. Thank you.

In Holy Communion the crucified and risen Christ is present, giving his true body and blood as food and drink. All baptized Christians are invited to the table where Christ himself is host. If you desire to be baptized, or to learn more about Holy Baptism, please speak to one of the pastors.

Grace Council Statement on Racism: Racism, manifested in individual acts and present throughout systems, continues to prevent us from being the beloved community that God intends. Our faith in the crucified and risen Christ compels us to speak. We speak against the sin of racism. We speak in solidarity with Black people and all people of color, each of whom is precious to God. We stand with and for Black people within our church and school and in the larger community.

We commit ourselves to following Jesus Christ into the world in the hope that, by the Spirit's power, God's Kingdom would come on earth as it is in heaven. We look with hope and anticipation to a season of growth and change as Grace becomes a more faithful witness to God's wide welcome in Christ. We see this as the beginning, not the end, of the conversation. We pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us, and for the courage to follow.

As We Gather

Along with seventy others at the beginning of Jesus' ministry we have been sent out. As much as we would like to stay huddled together and safely shielded from this world, that is not how it goes. In our baptism we have become laborers in the kingdom of God. Each of us fellow workers in the body of Christ. Called into public ministry. Washed up on new shores we find ourselves led into unfamiliar villages and towns. We know that all too well. There we experience surprises aplenty. Welcome and rejection. Fear and joy. Just to name a few. Still, we go. Filled with the Spirit, accompanied by one another, and sheltered by the God who goes with us. In those places we speak in our own voices of a peace that is lamb-like amid the cries of the wolves. A peace that is powerful and cruciform. A peace that speaks of a new creation that is our promised future. And the kingdom of God has come near.

In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us and, for his sake, God forgives us all our sins.




⁶Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.
