We welcome you in the name of Jesus Christ as we gather to hear God's holy Word and celebrate the meal of Holy Communion. We are blessed by your presence, just as you are. As God welcomes all people through the saving grace of Jesus, so do we seek to welcome God's people of all races, social statuses, physical and mental abilities, sexual orientations, and gender identities to be together in Christ – to love, to grow, and to serve. Should you have no church home, you are invited to consider Grace. We encourage you to fill out the perforated page on the back of the bulletin and place it in the offering plate. Welcome!

Children's resources, including activity bags, worship bulletins and booster seats, are available in the narthex and from the ushers.

Nursery care is provided at most worship services for children ages 4 and under. The nursery is located across from Fellowship Hall. From the atrium, go through the Lamb Door by the elevator, up half a flight of stairs and turn right. From the sanctuary, go through the door by the stone baptismal font, up the stairs and turn left. A silent paging system allows the nursery staff to contact parents when needed.

Assistance in Worship: For those who find it difficult to stand during any part of the service, please remain seated and contact an usher if you would like Holy Communion to be brought to you. Sound enhancement units are available in the back of the church. Large print bulletins are available from the ushers in the back of the church and at the Division Street door.

In Holy Communion the crucified and risen Christ is present, giving his true body and blood as food and drink. All baptized Christians are invited to the table where Christ himself is host. If you desire to be baptized, or to learn more about Holy Baptism, please speak to one of the pastors.

Grace Council Statement on Racism: Racism, manifested in individual acts and present throughout systems, continues to prevent us from being the beloved community that God intends. Our faith in the crucified and risen Christ compels us to speak. We speak against the sin of racism. We speak in solidarity with Black people and all people of color, each of whom is precious to God. We stand with and for Black people within our church and school and in the larger community.

We commit ourselves to following Jesus Christ into the world in the hope that, by the Spirit's power, God's Kingdom would come on earth as it is in heaven. We look with hope and anticipation to a season of growth and change as Grace becomes a more faithful witness to God's wide welcome in Christ. We see this as the beginning, not the end, of the conversation. We pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us, and for the courage to follow.

As We Gather

The last we saw John the Baptist, he was full of fiery certainty. The Messiah is coming, and things are going to change! Today, we see John later in the story, but doubt seems to have crept in. Axes don't seem to have fallen; the chaff remains ungathered. To make matters worse, John finds himself imprisoned. Death is not far off. Was he wrong about Jesus? Should he wait for another? No, Jesus says, pointing to a different set of signs: the blind see and the lame walk. Good news is proclaimed. Jesus affirms John's status as the forerunner, but points to a Kingdom beyond even John's ability to grasp. In this new world, the greatest and the least shall find themselves all together. But it won't happen right away. We wait not for another, but we do wait for Jesus. Be patient, James writes, urging us to dig deep into this time of Advent. Jesus will come again, but perhaps not how we'd expect, and perhaps not how we'd prefer. But he's coming. Be patient. Hope will not disappoint.

MARY

We Lutherans tend to downplay the role of Mary in the Christian story for fear she may overshadow the person and work of Christ. But how could there be a person named Jesus without a mother? Mary is too significant an agent in God's story of redemption to be confined to the role of a pregnant teenager in a Christmas pageant. In the New Testament we see her at the wedding at Cana, at the foot of the cross, and at the empty tomb Easter morning. We are reminded of Mary when we recite the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds, and in services of Evening Prayer when we sing Mary's song of praise, the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55; pages 147-48 of the green hymnal).

To appreciate Mary's song it is crucial to know the context out of which it arose. The Magnificat came to Luke from a circle of Jewish Christians who were poor and humble, people we might today call "the marginalized." They knew they could not trust in their own strength but had to rely in utter confidence upon God. Luke portrays Mary as the first disciple by making her a spokeswoman for this community. When Mary speaks of God as her Savior, she associates salvation with the birth of Jesus Messiah. That was the faith by which her community lived.

The Magnificat has three parts: an introduction praising God (v. 46-47); the body of the hymn in two stanzas; and the conclusion (v. 54-55). In the introduction Mary reminds us of how she had found favor with God not because she was worthy but because God was gracious to her. Hence her joy in the Lord.

In the first stanza (v. 48-50), the attributes of God that are cited — God is the Mighty One, holy and merciful — were those most admired by the community of the poor who were dependent upon him. Because she was "of low estate" and a "servant" Mary is associated with the poor ones whom God has helped by his power, whether they are women yearning for children or Israel reduced to low estate by oppression. Mary was the first to know that the child to be born would be called holy (Luke 1:35).

In the second stanza, (v. 51-53), Mary's song becomes explicitly communal with historical roots. It may take considerable imagination to think that the embryo in Mary's womb has already put down the mighty from their thrones; she is actually expressing the hope of her community. Poverty and hunger here are primarily spiritual, nevertheless poverty was a reality among Jerusalem Christians in the post-Easter church. But this is not a call to class warfare. It is a reminder that wealth and power have no standing in God's sight.

The conclusion of Mary's song (v. 54-55) is like a coda. That God has helped his "servant Israel" echoes Mary's rejoicing in the opening verses. Since the "helping" has begun with the conception of the Messiah, Mary can proclaim that this promise has been fulfilled and God's covenant of mercy reaches beyond Israel to all people.

As the Jewish philosopher Hannah Arendt has written, genuine newness, not a new fashion or a new model of something already existing, but radical newness comes into the world only with a new birth. "Of the Father's love begotten..."
