

The light of Christ shines among us



If you are like me, you are not ready to take down your Christmas tree or put away all of your holiday lights and decorations just yet. It seems like we especially need those extra flickers of comfort and joy in January, when the winter moves in slow motion and the gray settles in. I think that is why, thanks to the wisdom of our ancestors in faith, the darkest months in the northern hemisphere are when we celebrate the feasts of light. "The star once over Bethlehem now rests on our gathering. The One revealed to the magi on the first Epiphany continues to be revealed to us as the salvation of the whole world." Our God of Light has come to dwell in our darkest night, literally. God has come to live among us; deep in our flesh, deep in this wounded world. The Light revealed in the infant Jesus shines with and alongside you in the midst of your very real life and all its joys and sorrows. After the holiday glitz has been put away his flame still shimmers with promise. This light follows you through every valley and will not be extinguished even in your death. He will lead you around every turn into the break of day, on both sides of the grave.

During this stretch of long nights and gray skies we gather on Sunday mornings around the light of Christ, as it shines in our midst. The star once over Bethlehem now rests on our gathering. The One revealed to the magi on the first Epiphany continues to be revealed to us as the salvation of the whole world. This light is always revealed in word and meal for you — as nourishment and sustenance for your journey, bread for every season. From this place he illumines our tables, our relationships, our serving and all our work for the sake of all creation.

And in the miracle of our baptism, which we celebrated on January 8, we each have become a light, as the deacon always proclaims to the newly baptized in the baptismal liturgy. You and I are signs of this epiphany. God in flesh made known in you, Grace River Forest. Signs and wonders to behold.

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We need the light of our neighbors to show us the way as we live out the callings God has given us in this time and place. We shined brightly as we welcomed 2023 in community with an Epiphany brunch. We will hold a candle for each other as we continue the work of becoming a more welcoming community at a retreat for staff and lay-leaders sponsored by the justice and peace committee. We shine together as Sunday School, confirmation, and high schoolers pack lunches for hungry neighbors to kick off a new faith formation semester. And we will luminate each other's paths in ways big and small all year long.

I see your light as it spreads from Bonnie Brae and Division, beyond. I am thankful for all the ways we bear witness to the light that shines in the darkness. And the darkness has not overcome it, no matter what it feels like right now. So we follow the light until Epiphany gives way to Lent and the cross gives way to the empty garden tomb, and winter gives way to spring.

Books for Bible readers

From the Grace library

Winter is the best time to curl up with a good book. How about a good book about *the* Good Book?

The church library is a wonderful resource for anyone wishing to spend a bit of time reading a variety of authors' thoughts about the Bible. Of course, there are quite a few different translations and versions of the Bible itself, as well as commentaries and concordances available for checkout.

On the library door, you will find a section of a bibliography sharing titles in our collection about the Bible. If you prefer, you can also stop in and scan the shelves in the 220 section, where many books about the Bible are located.

Some of works about the Bible include *The Book Jesus Read* by Philip Yancy, which shares insights into the Old Testament. The preface, itself, is an interesting read: "...the two main barriers to reading the Old Testament: It doesn't always make sense, and what sense it does make offends modern ears therefore the Old Testament, three-fourths of the Bible, often goes unread." In author Yancy's readable style, he makes a case for the realism of Old Testament violence as a mirror for what we see around us today, although he "detects a gradual but certain movement toward grace."

Whose Bible Is It? by Jaroslav Pelikan shares the author's research and personal thoughts about the links between Jewish, Roman Catholic and Protestant versions of scripture. He discusses which books are included in each faith tradition and why. He breaks apart our comfortable division of Old and New Testaments.

And for something totally unique, pick up 40: *The Biblical Story* by Joel School-Tanis. This signed copy is in the children's section of the library. It is filled with illustrations by the author, but it is not your average children's Bible story book. The text is invented spelling, think early-child writing style, and the observations are often not scripturally accurate. It may be a good book to read *with* your child as you discuss the author's interpretation.

Justice and Peace Committee hosts Leadership Retreat By Lance Wilkening

After the murder of George Floyd in 2020, the Grace congregation and school committed to addressing the sin of racism in all its forms, wherever it occurs. We embarked on the Black Voices at Grace sessions to provide a forum for Black and other Grace members of color to tell the stories of the acts of racism and discrimination they live through every day.

The next step in this journey is a leadership retreat to be held on Saturday, February 11. The retreat will include members of the clergy, staff, Church Council, boards, and committees as well as representatives from Grace School. Black Voices at Grace asked our members of color to be vulnerable and tell their stories.

This retreat will now provide the opportunity for members of the church leadership to tell their stories, trusting that the Holy Spirit will guide the conversation and open up new ways of thinking about how Grace can become a more just and inclusive community of faith – truly One Body in Christ. The retreat will be facilitated by Rev. Sunitha Mortha, Associate to the Bishop and Director of Diversity, Equity, and Belonging for the Metro Chicago Synod of the ELCA. Rev. Mortha is excited to be part of Grace's journey, and we welcome her guidance and wisdom.

The Grace Council Statement on Racism says it best: "We look with hope and anticipation to a season of growth and change as Grace becomes a more faithful witness to God's wide welcome in Christ." We pray that the retreat brings this season of growth and change ever closer to fruition.

Stockings for the Night Ministry

SMC projects in numbers

Gift Cards for The Night Ministry

We collected a total of \$1500 in gift cards for The Night Ministry from the school and congregation. The gift cards were distributed to the unhoused population the Night Ministry serves in Chicago.

Gift Cards for Oak-Leyden Developmental Services

We made Christmas a little jollier for more than 30 area adults with developmental and intellectual disabilities. We collected more gift cards for Oak-Leyden this year than any previous year.

We collected \$750 in contributions for the LCFS Christmas drive, helping to put gifts under the tree for children in the organization's care. Thanks to Marilyn and Gary Wenzel, who delivered the funds to LCFS on Grace's behalf.


