

Encounters with Christ

Where have you encountered Jesus Christ? At what times in your life has Jesus been particularly present? To be sure, Christ is with us always, even unto the end of the age. So, too, is he dependably present for us as we gather faithfully around Word and sacrament.

His presence can be trusted. Still, I imagine there have been times in your life when Jesus has shown up in powerful ways. Perhaps you've gone through other seasons when his presence has felt less tangible.

Encounters with Christ

Our theme at Grace for Lent is *Encounters with Christ*. Our readings for worship through the season present us with encounters various people have with Jesus throughout his ministry.

After his encounter with Satan in the wilderness, we'll see Nicodemus come to Jesus at night and an unnamed woman whom he meets during the day. Jesus will meet a man born blind, then he'll meet Mary and Martha in their grief and Lazarus in his grave. Finally, Jesus will encounter the powers of this world head on. Sin, evil, and death will look to win the day. They will fail.

During this season, as we walk once more toward the cross of Christ and the empty tomb of Easter morning, we'll read daily devotions prepared by members of the Grace community. You will read

powerful stories of how these people have been encountered by Christ along life's journey and deep insights into the biblical witness. My prayer for you, dear people of Grace, is that this season of Lent is one of deep meaning for you. Like Nicodemus and the woman at the well, like the man born blind and Lazarus, we are changed by the encounter. We are born again. We are gifted the water of life. We develop eyes to see all that God is doing. We are called forth from our graves and stripped of our graveclothes; clothed instead with the righteousness of Christ.

As Christ encounters you anew throughout Lent, may you feel his promised presence in your life, preparing us for the great feast of Easter when his presence will be all in all.

On Wednesdays during Lent, from March 1 to March 29, we worship at 8:25 a.m., I I:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. The 7:00 p.m. services will be livestreamed. Supper will be served in Fellowship Hall at 6:00 p.m.



Lenten readings

From the Grace Church Library

As we move into Lent the Church Library committee has many thoughts and reading suggestions. A short devotional/faith journey book from Martin and Micah Marty titled *Places Along the Way* follows the Bible narrative from Creation to Easter. There are photographs from biblical places accompanying each verse, devotion and prayer. Martin's thoughts and Micah's photos are precious glimpses into the Christian fellowship of this father/son team.

Another take on the life of Jesus is provided by James R. Mills in the historical fiction book *Memoirs of Pontius Pilate*. The author, a politician himself, brings his perspective to fictional reflections of Pilate and the impact Jesus had on his life. Remembering the fictional nature of this book, you will still find it an interesting read.

More serious – and definitely not fictional – are the next two titles: A Violent Grace: Meeting Christ at the Cross by Michael Card uses Old and New Testament references to walk us through the life and ministry of Jesus. We see familiar stories through a new lens – almost as if we were on the scene. Each chapter ends with a prayer focusing on the sacrifice Jesus made on our behalf and our humble response to it.

Hanging by a Thread by Samuel Wells is a tough study. This short book is all about the cross: no sugar coating or easy narration. Wells views the cross as the "heart of God laid bare." He puts us in our place when we wonder where God is when we hurt. "If you ever look up to the sky and shout 'Oh God, why?" you are looking in the wrong place. You need to be looking into the face of the crucified Jesus."

If you are looking for a thought-provoking lesson as we walk again in to Lent, Hanging by a Thread is recommended.

Grace Lutheran School's annual open house was a success! Grace parents and five 8th grade students graciously volunteered their time for the event, and we needed them! We had 24 families attend. Twelve of those families were looking into Early Childhood grades and twelve were interested in the Elementary level. Fifteen of the families who attended had never visited Grace before. Nine out of those 15 families have applied to Grace School.

As of January 31, Grace School's re-enrollment for next year is at 171 (93 % retention from last year) with 52 applications. Shadow dates and parent interviews have been set for many of the applicants in the upcoming months. Lord willing, we will have many more to come. We are so thankful to God for His blessings upon our school. We are continuing to host First Look Friday admission events, with the next three dates being February 10, February 24, and March 24. In addition, to increase visibility of our school in the community, Grace will be a part of the 27th Annual Forest Park St. Patrick's Day parade on March 4. Please join us if you are able!

It is always our desire to get involved in our community and share what Grace has to offer. At last — St. Mathew Passion performances at Grace, March 25 and 26

Three years ago, on Tuesday evening, March 10, 2020, singers from the Grace choir and from Chicago Choral Artists gathered in Fellowship Hall for a two-and-a-half hour rehearsal of J. S. Bach's St. Matthew Passion. They had been working on this music for ten weeks, and they were just 17 days away from the scheduled performances.

They were also just days away from everything shutting down because of the pandemic. Grace Church worship services moved online on March 15. Governor Pritzker's stay-athome order went into effect on March 21. There would be no Passion performances in the spring of 2020. The St. Matthew Passion weekend, March 28 and 29 of 2020, came and went, and for singers especially, left a big hole.

Thankfully, three years later we are once again worshiping in person and again anticipating Holy Week and Easter. And the St. Matthew Passion is back.

Once again, performances are a joint venture between Grace's Bach Cantata Vespers Ministry and Chicago Choral Artists (a group directed by Grace Cantor Michael D. Costello). Again there are two weekend performances: Saturday, March 25 at 6 p.m., and Sunday, March 26 at 4 p.m. And again, Bach's extraordinary music offers an opportunity not just to experience the drama of Jesus' suffering and death on the cross, but also to reflect on what it means for you and for all.

A tenor soloist narrates the story, following Matthew's gospel, with other singers taking the parts of Jesus, Pontius Pilate, and Peter and the chorus singing the words of those who demand Jesus' crucifixion. There are solo arias with poetic, personal texts that address Jesus with words of love and devotion and express the heartfelt grief of believers. Bach's exquisitely harmonized settings of Passion chorales also comment on the story. You will recognize this music, especially the tune of "O Sacred Head Now Wounded," which appears five times in the Passion.

In the concert world, critics describe the St. Matthew Passion as an oratorio, a sacred story told in music. But performed in a church, as Bach originally presented it on Good Friday in 1727 and again in 1729, it is a devotional experience, a meditation on God's suffering love for us. The music requires some commitment — after a three-year pandemic hiatus, the choir is again spending endless hours in rehearsal. Performances will last approximately three and a half hours, including a 20-minute intermission. We've waited a long time. Come and experience the music. It will be time well spent.

Grace VBS Mission Team Returns to Slovakia

This summer, a team of twenty-one members from Grace will once again journey to Martin, Slovakia, to teach Vacation Bible School at the Center for Christian Education (CCE).

Trip organizers are Children's Ministry Coordinator Julie Modrich and Dave and Erika Lyle. Julie says, "We're excited to be returning to Martin to teach VBS and share the Gospel with the people of Slovakia." This will be Grace's sixth mission trip to Slovakia since 2016 (trips planned for 2020 and 2021 were cancelled due to the pandemic).

Trip Details

The team will arrive in Vienna on Friday, July 7, and will be met by CCE's bus for the ride to Martin, a city in central Slovakia with a population of 55,000. They will stay in a traditional Slovak boutique hotel just steps from the CCE campus.

The week of VBS will include daily worship, dramas, videos, arts and crafts, games and more. Students enrolled in CCE's extended day care program will also enjoy some afternoon surprises presided over by members of the Grace team.

Evenings and weekends offer free time to explore this eminently walkable city, enjoy hearty Slovak cuisine in one of Martin's eateries, and savor the many flavors of Slovak ice cream. The week will be concluded with a program for VBS families and a CCE-hosted farewell party. Then, the team will return to Vienna for a brief "after-trip" before arriving home on July 18.

Slovak Students Visit Grace

Before the mission trip, Grace will welcome between two and four Slovak teens in June. Staying with Grace host families, the students will gain valuable experience helping to plan and conduct VBS at Grace (June 19-23) while also experiencing Lutheran worship in America, practicing their English, and enjoying some Chicago sights. Armed with this experience, Julie said, "the students will return to Slovakia with the Grace mission team to serve as translators and aides for CCE's VBS program."

Two Decades of Partnership

Grace launched its first Slovak mission trip in 2007, when Pastor Phyllis Kersten led twenty adults to Martin. Some taught a two-week course of English as a Foreign Language to residents, while others completed much needed repairs on one of CCE's landmark buildings.

The Center for Christian Education in Martin, Slovakia, is one of Grace Church's regular benevolences.

"This marks our seventeenth year of partnership with CCE. Year after year, it's exciting to see how God is at work in Martin, Slovakia," said Pastor Dave Lyle.

PERPETUA, FELICITY AND THEIR COMPANIONS, MARTYRS AT CARTHAGE By Pastor Hans Dumpys

On March 7, the Church remembers Perpetua, Felicity and their companions, martyrs at Carthage, North Africa, now modern Tunisia. In 202 the emperor Septimus Severus forbade conversions to Christianity and harsh persecutions followed. Vibia Perpetua, an educated married noblewoman with an infant son, Felicity, a pregnant slave, and catechumens Revocatus, Saturninus, Secundulus and their catechist Saturus were all arrested. Philip Pfatteicher writes about them: "No saints are more uniformly honored in the early calendars and martyrologies than these African martyrs."

"The Passion of Perpetua and Felicity" is an important document for understanding early Christian martyrdom and providing insight into the young and vigorous African church.

Part of the "Passion" is said to have been written by Perpetua herself, part by her catechist, with an introduction and a conclusion by an eyewitness. It is a uniquely personal document filled with painfully intimate details of Perpetua's imprisonment as she is subject to hunger, fears, and as a nursing mother separated from her child, the pain of swollen breasts. We sense the struggle of a woman to claim her identity and vocation amid the competing claims of society, including the pleadings of her non-Christian father and the proconsul. There is no suggestion that Perpetua scorns motherhood or the bonds of family, but one senses that in Christ she has found the power and freedom to name herself and the courage to accept the consequences.

Perpetua does not relish the prospect of death. But in a series of prophetic visions she finds the conviction that her fate is ordained and that her brief suffering will lead to eternal reward. She is undeterred when at the trial she and her companions

receive the most terrifying sentence: to fight with wild beasts in the amphitheater. In another dream she perceives that she will be fighting "not with beasts, but against the devil: and I knew that mine was the victory."

From the eyewitnesses who completed Perpetua's narrative, we learn something about her companion and servant Felicity. Eight months pregnant at her imprisonment, Felicity was fearful that because of her condition she would be separated from her companions. After a night of ardent prayer, she went into labor and gave birth to a daughter, whom she was able to entrust to Christian friends. On the last day of life the prisoners celebrated a "love feast" attended by many local Christians. The next morning the prisoners went from the darkness of their prison into the glaring amphitheater, "as it were to heaven, cheerful and bright of countenance."

In a final poignant image the two young women, formerly mistress and servant, now sisters in Christ, turned to one another before the jeering crowd and exchanged a kiss, symbolic of peace and fulfillment. A fitting epitaph for Perpetua, Felicity, and their companions is the saying of the early church fathers: the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the church.

In Carthage a basilica was erected over the tomb of the martyrs, the Basilica Maiorum, where an ancient inscription bearing the names of Perpetua and Felicitas has been found.

Advanced care planning

"Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die.' "John II: 25-26a.

I recently had the privilege of leading an adult education class on the topic of advanced care planning. The two-part class focused on planning related to both end-of-life health care and finances. It was a blessing to begin the End-of-life planning conversation at Grace and I hope to continue the conversation with many individuals and families during my ministry. It is a gift to your family and yourself to share your wishes, long before it is necessary.

The purpose of advanced care planning is to share, while still healthy, one's values, wishes and goals related to end of life care and death. Through conversations and discussions about your desires, your family and loved ones will feel better prepared to make medical decisions for you when you are no longer able to do so.

Advanced care planning comes in a variety of forms and documents. Advanced directives are written documents that communicate what a person wants or does not want should they become unable to communicate their wishes. A durable power of attorney is an advanced directive that appoints someone (an agent) to make decisions for a person if in the future he/she cannot make their own medical decisions.

A living will is an advanced directive that tells what medical treatment a person does or does not want if they are unable to make their wishes known. While documenting your wishes is important, it is equally important to explore what your goals and values are and what you want your end of life to look like.

These can be difficult and overwhelming conversations. But they can also be a blessing to all involved. Don't rush these conversations. Be patient and let the discussion unfold over time.

The pastoral care team has prepared a folder of resources that can help to facilitate both advanced care planning document completion and advanced care planning conversations. The folder also includes information related to funeral planning at Grace and includes a funeral information sheet. Please share your copy of completed funeral plans to be securely stored in my office. Alternatively, f you would like to continue the conversation with me or the pastors before making any decisions, keep in mind that pastoral care is always available

I find solace in the words our pastors share when they announce a death before a Sunday morning service:

"As always, we gather, not as those without hope, but as those who know the hope and promise of resurrection through our Lord, Jesus Christ." Amen.

Volunteering at Grace By Julie Hinz

At Grace, we are blessed with many opportunities for using our gifts, impacting God's mission here in this place and out into the world. Committees of volunteers work toward social justice, provide material needs to those outside our walls, organize our education opportunities, and teach our children about God. We have teams of people who work behind the scenes to get mailings out, make meals, write devotions, and make worship happen. There is no shortage of ways to reimagine our own skills and talents and how they might be used for service and worship. Every Sunday morning God's beloved children gather at Grace around Word and Sacrament. You are here, surrounded by your church family who knows and loves you. What better time and place to serve!

If we peek behind the "worship curtain," we see all the volunteers who work to make our amazing worship happen. Each Sunday, greeters welcome people into our building and ushers tend the sanctuary doors where they distribute bulletins, gather our offerings, managing the flow of people to the altar during communion, and assisting during any issues that may arise. Members of the altar guild prepare the altar and the elements for our communion meal, and our Livestream Team assures that our services are effectively heard and seen across the country.

When worship begins you encounter a Deacon, an assisting minister, and two lectors. Gift Bearers, carrying the elements forward to be consecrated and to assist with communion. In total, an ideal complement on a Sunday morning is 15 people per service and, once Sunday morning is done, those volunteers will have put in a combined total of 40 hours of time. Each of them bringing their gifts to bear on our worship.

Thank you, Ellie, for your years of service to Grace and to God's Kingdom here on earth.




