Sunday mornings will also feature Adult Education, Bible Study, Teen Talk, and more consistent and structured opportunities to get to know one another.

Bach Cantata Vespers resume on September 24 By Gwen Gotsch

Grace Church's Bach Cantata Vespers begins its 53rd season on Sunday, September 24, with *Bringet dem Herrn Ehre seines Namens* (Bring to the Lord the honor due his name). The preacher is Pastor Stephen Bouman, son of Paul Bouman, former music director at Grace who together with Carl Schalk, founded the series in 1971. The prelude at 3:45 p.m is Francis Poulenc's Organ Concerto in G minor, performed by Nicole Keller of the University of Michigan with the Bach Cantata Vespers Orchestra.


People come to these services from all over the Chicago area; others participate via livestream. Many of the worshipers are Grace members, others are not. Why do they come to these Sunday afternoon services? Why do we pay so much attention to music that is old and frankly, rather obscure? Why is the Cantata series still going strong after more than 50 years?

The cantatas that will be presented from September 2023 through May 2024 are mostly from Bach's first year of composing at the St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, Germany. Three hundred years ago, on May 30, 1723, the First Sunday after Trinity, J. S. Bach, the newly appointed Cantor, led Leipzig's musical forces in a performance of Cantata 75, *Die Elenden sollen essen*, a two-part, fourteenmovement work designed to demonstrate that the powersthat-be in Leipzig had made the right choice in hiring him.

A local paper reported that the music was received "with good applause," though the actual clapping of hands is unlikely since the performance took place during a church service. For the composer, 38 years old, it was the start of a remarkable period of disciplined, creative, furious output. He would present approximately 60 cantatas in the next 12 months, all of them his own compositions. Most were newly composed for the St. Thomas and St. Nikolai churches in Leipzig; some were cantatas composed at earlier places of employment but revised and repurposed. And when this first yearlong cycle of cantatas was completed, he began a second one.

Each cantata is a unique work; Bach makes new and original decisions at every turn, exploring different possibilities, forms, sonorities, theological ideas and human emotions.

Can we hear this music as Bach's 1723 audience heard it? Many, many things have changed in 300 years: everything from the map of Europe to the frequency of the pitches to which we tune our modern instruments. Women are now allowed to sing in the choir, and the availability of recordings has revolutionized our music-listening habits.

We experience time and distance differently in the 21st century. Our churches are heated, the musicians play from iPads, and preachers no longer preach for an hour at a time. Most of us can't pay attention for that long.

Yet some things *are* the same, especially for church-going Lutherans. As in Bach's day, our worship services follow the rhythms of the church year; Bach's cantatas were composed to follow the cycle of the liturgical year and relate to the gospel lessons appointed for specific occasions. Many of the cantatas in the 1723-24 cycle begin with a dictum, a quote from the Bible and go on to explain the scripture lesson and apply it to daily living, a shape similar to sermons or daily devotions we use today. And cantatas conclude with a prayerful response in the form of a familiar hymn. Bach's Lutheran theology is familiar as well: God's mercy and forgiveness are ours, not because of anything we do but through God's free grace.

Like 18th century Leipzig citizens, we need frequent assurance of God's grace and comfort. Like them we struggle, suffer, rejoice and despair. Bach's cantatas use the power of music to remind us of our human condition and reassure us that God is faithful.

So join us at Bach Cantata Vespers this fall — and not just to hear great music performed by skilled musicians. Come and worship and be reminded of what it is to be wrapped in God's grace.

Refugee Ministry update

We are eager to create a new co-sponsor team to prepare for our fourth refugee family. If you are interested in joining the effort or need more information, please contact Linda Street kentuckystreets53@gmail.com

- We continue to visit our existing sponsored families as they are able. Linda Martens and Linda Street took the Azizi mom and girls to Brookfield Zoo for a day of animals, butterflies, carousel rides, water play and "candy cotton." The two boys in the Abul Boshor family and two of the Azizi boys went with two men from our volunteer teams to watch a Chicago Fire soccer match. The Safari family is no longer interested in a co-sponsor connection. They have family in the city and are moving ahead independently. (These extra activities are not coming out of the Refugee Ministry budget.)
- Our work this summer has focused on offering support for the huge influx of migrants we have identified as "new neighbors". Stories from the city are mixed some wonderful and some reflecting gaps in the system. However, the amazing support from faith-based communities, Greater Chicago Food Depository and others is making a difference in the lives of these desperate people. The Grace contribution is connected to our partnership with the Harmony Food Pantry. Every time we are open, we meet customers signing in with passports or IDs from Venezuela, Guatemala, Honduras or other places. They speak little or no English and have not much more than the clothes on their backs. Grace donations have paid for sturdy backpacks (a temporary "home" as they are moved from place to place). Also included are towels, hygiene supplies, first aid kits, underwear, shorts and t-shirts and monthly supplies for the women. To date we have given away over 40 backpacks for adults and 10 for children.

We are watching the Holy Spirit in "real time" and it is very exciting!

Discipleship: The being and the doing

Fall seems like the perfect time to begin exploring our life of faith together — it brings the beginning of the school year, the startup of Sunday School, Bible Classes and Adult Education. Over the next months, we will be working through

the concept of discipleship and what that means to each of us as people of faith, what it

means at Grace, and what it means for our lives in the world.

Most of us understand a disciple to be any learner who follows a master teacher, or "one who wants to be like another." As "How do we not abandon our doing but balance it with our being in relationship with God so that both are life-giving and reflective of mature discipleship?"


Christians we learn about the 12 disciples and how they followed Jesus — from place to place, from event to event, from their invitation into relationship with Jesus all the way to their own deaths. During those three years they did not preach or heal, they did not invite any into discipleship or train new believers. Their job was to learn, to be in relationship with God and absorb all they could each day.

It has become easy to reduce our discipleship to the doing. We know we are to feed the poor, clothe the naked, tend to the sick, house the homeless. We serve on committees, we lead worship, we provide resources to those in need, and build each other up. These are all wonderful things and worthy of our time and attention. But consider this: the great commission — to go, teach, baptize — was given after the disciples spent three years learning and experiencing God through their relationship with Jesus. The beginning of true discipleship is not the necessarily the jumping in and doing what you think God wants. It is the intentional decision to spend time with God, to let God lead you to know yourself and His will for your life. It is the intentional building of your relationship with Jesus so that you become more like Him in your attitudes, focus and, ultimately, behavior.

> As I sit amid the blessed community that is Grace I see many familiar faces — the faces of knitters, cooks, teachers, workers, singers; the faces of people who jump in readily to help do the work of the church.

Being born and raised a Christian and a Lutheran, I am one of those people. But do I spend as much time being with God as I do doing for God? I have discovered my life is out of balance. I, like many, have forgotten the reality that discipleship's first step is being with God, listening to God, being in relationship with God.

The reality of this is a bit distressing. How do we balance these things? How do we not abandon our doing but balance it with our being in relationship with God so that both are life-giving and reflective of mature discipleship? This is our challenge, and we will explore this further as we move into the coming months. I encourage each of us to think about our own discipleship journey; how we understand God's will for our lives, how we act on that understanding, and how community and depth of faith play a role in how we live our lives as disciples of Jesus.
