I've recently been reading How To Read A Tree: Clues and Patterns from Bark and Leaves. According to the author, Tristan Gooley, "many trees that thrive near water have a distinctive rib on their leaves. They look like they have a stream down their middle." Some have been caring for our new neighbors who have come to Harmony and the food pantry since early 2023. There you are encountered by Christ who comes disguised as a stranger. I'm in awe of your faithful and steadfast witness.

In November, we discussed prayer as central to our life of discipleship. Today we explore the study of scripture,

another element key to our lives as disciples.

Connecting with another, conversing

with another, is how we build any relationship. Connecting with God is no different. The study of scripture is how we build lives of discipleship. mercy. We encounter sinners and broken people whom God called to lead and serve. Everything we encounter is useful in examining our own lives and our journey into a



The most significant thing about why scriptural study holds a central place in our journey into discipleship is the reality that scripture asks us to stop from the busyness of life, listen to what God is saying, ponder what it means for our "here and

now," and allow the Word to change us.

So, how do we study scripture? "How-to's" are easy to find (just search Google!) but most fail to express the journey of biblical study, which is a lifetime adventure. Like watching a favorite movie or reading a favorite book repeatedly, something new is revealed every time, and your growing faith reveals new truths each time. The Bible is filled with stories of miracles, wars, infighting, faithfulness, jealousy, betrayal, frustration, drama, and love. Something for every reader! Some passages speak clearly to our hearts and others require more context or information. Spending time within its pages can be transformative. Other spiritual sources like inspirational writings of faith, devotionals, and sermons are also good sources for thinking about and knowing God in different ways.

Spiritual study feeds our daily lives of faith and shows us what God wants for us and from us. It challenges us in our discipleship journey. We learn about the law and how it both commands and condemns, as well as how we are saved through Christ's fulfillment of the law on our behalf. We walk with Jesus' first disciples, see them stumble and make mistakes, and experience with them God's grace and

This is not something we must do alone. Personal study and devotion are good and right, but studying together enhances our understanding and reveals questions we may never have considered. When we study as a community of faith, we share in the wealth of knowledge and insight that everyone brings to the table. We teach each other, connect, and grow together in our mutual discipleship journey. We see how faith draws us together in community and sustains us as we live our lives as Jesus' disciples. Employee Retention Credit

Last year, Grace received notice that our application for the Employee Retention Credit had been approved. The Employee Retention Credit (ERC) is a tax credit for certain eligible businesses and tax-exempt organizations that had employees and were affected during the COVID-19

pandemic. Grace applied for credits totaling \$712,000, of which we have so far received \$678,000. We paid a contingent fee of \$102,000 to an outside firm to facilitate and manage our application.

The Council appointed a committee to propose a plan to best put these funds to work for the sake of Grace's mission. As these are one-time-only funds, the committee decided it would not be wise to use them for the recurring costs of the current operating budget. So, attention was given to ideas that would enable us to deal with predictable large one-time expenses and upgrades in maintaining our property or investments that would yield ongoing returns that can be helpful with recurring costs.

The proposed plan was adopted at the November meeting of the Council. The first action taken was to tithe a portion of these funds to ministries beyond Grace.

10% (\$58,000) has been allocated for benevolence; a portion of these funds have already been distributed to Housing Forward and Lutheran Disaster Response to support ministry to migrants both locally and internationally.

Second, the Council acted to put these funds to work for the future of Grace's ministry. So, 54% (\$311,000) has been allocated to the Forward in Faith school endowment fund, which will support excellent, Christ-centered education at Grace for years to come and lower the amount of offering revenue needed to support the mission of the school. The remaining 36% (\$207,000) has been allocated to our capital maintenance fund. This money will help us tend to the coming needs of our facilities in the future so that current gifts can better support mission and ministry. It is a blessing to have these funds to gift beyond Grace and to invest in God's future at Grace.

These monies will help us tend to future needs for ministry. Your continued generosity in supporting current mission and ministry is both needed and appreciated.

Two summaries:


Small Mercies: Glimpses of God in Everyday Life by Nancy Jo Sullivan is a collection of times in the author's life when she recognized the hand of God. Sometimes in the voice of a friend or an encounter with a stranger. But her takeaway is that God is in the world with us and we will see Him if we look.

Baptized for this Moment by Stephen Paul Bouman starts out as a journal of sorts. We follow Pastor Bouman through his experiences following the September I I attack on New York, where he was living and working. By sharing his real-life journey, he gives helpful commentary regarding how we can deal with current and future tragedies. Whether the disasters are global or personal, the healing process can be the same. "Show up. Listen. Tell stories. Pray."

The later chapters in this book are a direct challenge to the church. How can we bring a Christian voice to the public square? How might we generate interfaith dialog in our communities to mitigate bias and hatred that often lead to tragedy? Given current events, this book is right on the mark.



Church giving as of January 10, 2024: \$203,000 (19% behind budget, and \$61,000 (7%) behind last year. The current deficit is \$112,000 (\$18,000 deficit last year through January 31.)
