For God So Loved the World

We are in the long middle of Lent. The ashes have faded, at least physically, from our foreheads. Yet the joyous cries of Easter surprise remain far off. Here, in the middle, we are reminded with great clarity of what Lent is all about. On the Fourth Sunday in Lent, we are confronted with the verse that is more well known, perhaps, than any other in the Bible. In his nighttime conversation with Nicodemus (so different from the Samaritan woman at the well in the next chapter), Jesus speaks plainly: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." And, for good measure: "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

For God so loved. That little word with which John 3:16 begins is so important. *For* God so loved the world. Why did God give the Son? Because God had to do so? Because of our sin? Because God was in some way bound to act? No. God gives the only Son because of God's love. God's love, the love which constitutes the triune relationships, is the reason for everything God does. God's love, which is always freely given (how else can love be given?) is why Jesus takes on our lot and our life, why he suffers and dies. The reason, the foundation, lies not in what is wrong with us, but in what is good with God.

Because God so loves, God gives. God gives Jesus, and from Jesus we receive the gifts of forgiveness and life, both abundant and eternal. Perhaps during Lent, you have been giving, too. Giving up is something many of us do during this time of year, and rightly so. Lent is a good time to declutter the spiritual messes of our lives and focus on Christ who is our center. But we need not stop there. If we give some things up, we can better give other things: Our time, talent, and treasure, all signs of God's gracious love.

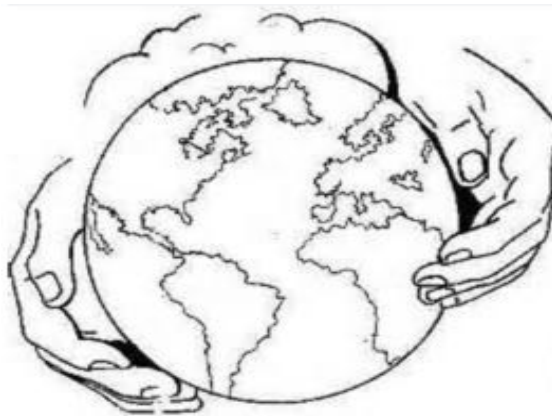
As Lent moves on, we continue to give. We seek ways to express God's love to those around us.

For the sake of God's love, we support people who arrive in our midst as refugees and migrants. For the sake of God's love, we support the work of Grace School, where children grow in so many ways. For the sake of God's love, we feed those in need, from the homebound of our community to the hungry in North Lawndale. For the sake of God's love, we give ourselves to each other, discovering a community of love that extends to this whole creation.

We focus on the shadows of our sin and mortality, but only so that the light of Christ may shine forth all the brighter. After all, when you come forward this Sunday and hold out your empty hand,

you'll hear that word again: The body of Christ, given for you. Being so fed and filled, may you be sustained until we break the fast and erupt in Easter acclamation. By this, and for the sake of God's love, is the whole creation saved.



Refugee Ministry Update: Many Thanks!

Through the generosity of this fellowship at Grace we have been able to support multiple refugee/migrant populations. There are bins in the atrium that have been continuously refilled with items needed for Oak Park migrants as well as those we meet at Harmony Church and food pantry in Chicago. The backpack program at Harmony has provided hundreds of migrant families with clothing, hygiene items, and a sturdy backpack to serve as their mobile “home” – as they are frequently relocated. Additionally, we have given winter coats, hats, gloves, and scarves (donated by you) to anyone who comes through the pantry in need. And finally, we are working with a new (fourth) refugee family through our partnership with RefugeeOne. A mother, father, two young boys, and a little girl who will be treated at Shriners Hospital. We are already falling in love with them.

And a personal reflection: I feel like I am one of the disciples walking around at the Feeding of the 5,000. I have been given a basket with a few fish and some bread. As I look at the huge crowd, I feel like this is an impossible task. But each time I reach into the basket there is enough to go around. Unexpected partnerships with other churches, generous donations from friends of Grace, a check in the mail from a man in Connecticut... plus the continuous support of this faith community. We are watching the Holy Spirit work in “real time,” truly!

Discipleship: Friendship and Fellowship

It's been some time since we talked about how we mark ourselves as Disciples of Christ and how we can work toward better discipleship. As we refocus, I want you to think about the people with whom you surround yourself. Family, work

friends, college friends, and church friends, are all important parts of our lives.

Whether you are an introvert or an extrovert, whether you have a large group of friends, a small group, or prefer dogs over people, it can become lonely and draining when you live without the fellowship of others. This also affects your discipleship. No matter what type of personality you have, when you have no connection to other believers, life can become very lonely, and your faith life can easily falter.

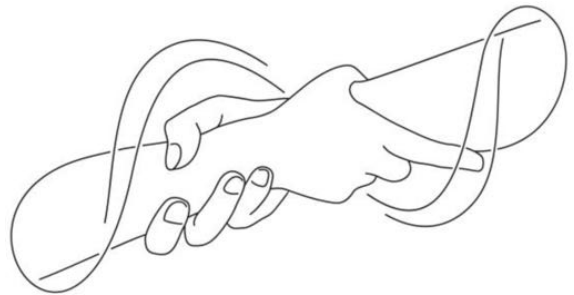
Our life as a congregation thrives because we have these interrelationships. We practice our faith together in this place and in our homes in a variety of ways that bring us closer to God. From willingly and lovingly caring for others through our Stephen Ministry program to grilling at the picnic; from obtaining roofing quotes to teaching VBS here and in Slovakia, you are building Christian friendships that nurture and support your faith.

These faith-filled relationships strengthen us as we walk in discipleship. They also strengthen the other people with whom we journey. I vividly recall the many years when my father, who is a pastor, believed his career demanded a "nose-to-the-grindstone" approach. Now, in his later years, he recognized that not making time for friendship and personal fellowship was a flawed approach to ministry.

Today I urge you to consider the people in your life with whom you could talk about matters of faith. I then urge you to have a conversation. It gets easier the more you do it, and

both you and that other person will benefit from sharing your faith stories and your questions. Being in relationship with God and with all God's people is one of our greatest gifts. Explore those friendships and take time to build them by opening up the topic of faith as a bond that helps keep your faith alive and thriving. Discipleship requires others.

New Books in the Church Library

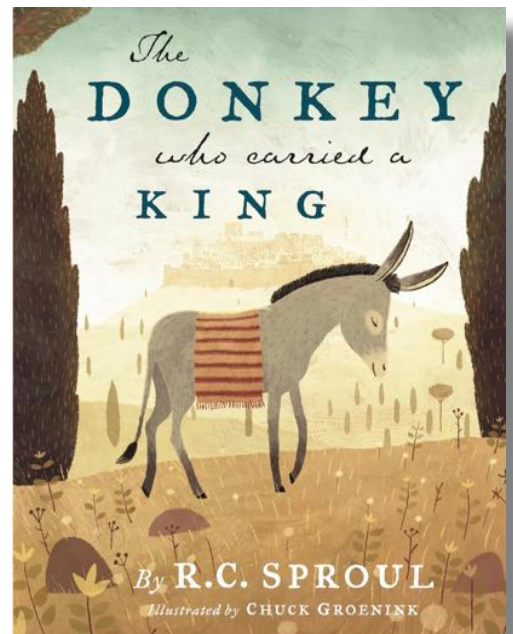
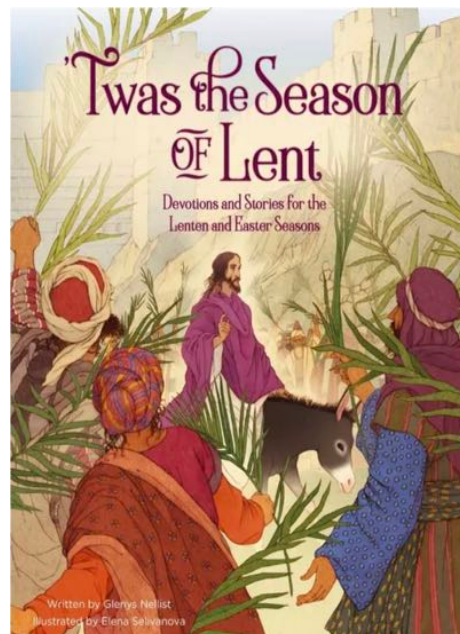
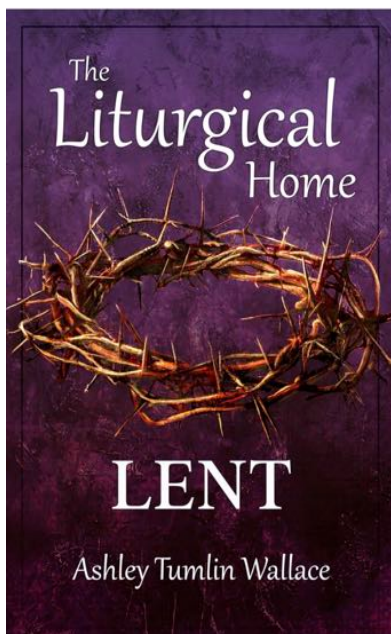
For those of us of a certain age, with years of liturgical experience under our belts, the season of Lent is the time when we focus on prayer, Bible study and self-reflection in preparation for Easter. But for those new to Lutheran traditions Lent is a totally foreign concept. So, with that in mind, the library recommends a new book, *Lent: The Liturgical Home*, by Ashley Tumlin Wallace. The author introduces the season of Lent, shares ways to observe it in your home, explains the meaning behind some of our Lenten traditions and offers family devotions. She even adds traditional Lenten recipes from around the world. This book is full of meaningful ways to "embrace the grace that is so freely offered to us in Christ," as she puts it.

Explaining the Lenten season to children is also sometimes a challenge. So, two new children's books have been added. *'Twas the Season of Lent* by Glenys Nellist is a 40-day devotion and story book. Written in poetry and prose, this book focuses on events in Jesus' life leading up to His death and resurrection.

Prayer prompts encourage children to follow Jesus's example and do what God calls them to. Illustrations by Elena Selivanova bring the stories to life and offer a perfect way for adults to share the powerful meaning of Lent with young ones they love.

Another new children's book shares several life lessons as we view the passion story through the eyes of a young donkey. *The Donkey Who Carried a King*, by Dr. R. C. Sproul speaks directly to the experiences of young listeners as we learn that the king was actually a suffering servant. The moral of this story is that "Jesus was willing to leave the glories of heaven to suffer and die in this world on our behalf, so we should serve Him with all our hearts."

All of these new books are on display in the Atrium case. If you would like to check them out, please ask at the front desk and someone will open the glass for you.

During Women's Month, I express gratitude to those who faithfully support programs that empower and uplift women globally, particularly the International Women Leaders (IWL) initiative, which is sustained yearly by communities including Grace Lutheran Church. As an IWL scholar from the class of 2022, I am grateful to share with you a small window into the life of one of my fellow IWL graduates. Grace Koch Muchahary is an Augsburg University graduate with a BA in Sociology. She has used the skills she developed throughout the program to positively influence several children in her homeland.

Hello, I'm Grace Koch Muchahary, and I'm originally from Assam, India. I am a scholar from the 2022 class of the ELCA's IWL program, with a major in Sociology. I used to pray as a child, "One day, I want to study abroad." I became the person I am now because of the IWL program, which allowed me to fully experience life, connect with my inner thoughts, and identify my basic beliefs and core values. IWL has grown to be a significant part of my identity and my life journey as a woman leader in my hometown and beyond. Participating in the IWL scholarship provided me with numerous opportunities for personal development and dialogue around gender justice and equality in my own community. I want to become a channel of blessing and a good example to our younger generations and IWL helped me a lot to have the opportunity to speak in my community about leadership and equity since I was 18 years old.

Having grown up in a very collectivist environment where values are instilled in us by our parents and communities, many younger generations are discouraged from following their own passions and discovering their true selves.

My current relationship with the church community stems from my volunteer work as International Fundraiser at Zion English Medium School, where I help raise money for improvements and build buildings, facilities and resources for the faculty and students. This allows us to enroll our community's children in a school where they will be taught both secular and biblical life lessons. Finally, I want to say how much I will always be appreciative of the IWL and all of the donors who extended their kindness and compassion to several young women leaders from all over the world.

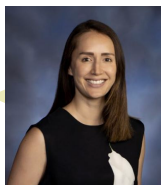
